Vegetation Work in Your Neighborhood

Quick Facts

- Certain trees and large shrubs in the area above the pipe can interfere with PG&E's safe operation of the gas pipeline
- PG&E has identified trees that will need to be removed in the city of Sunnyvale
- Following the removal work, PG&E will be restoring the areas with compatible landscaping
- There will be no interruption of your gas and electric service

City of Sunnyvale

As part of PG&E's ongoing focus on safety, we regularly patrol, inspect and survey our natural gas transmission pipeline. It is common for our pipeline to travel underground and beneath roads and private property. Maintaining the area above the pipeline and ensuring ready access is a key part of our ability to safely operate the pipeline. Certain trees and vegetation in the area above the pipeline can interfere with PG&E's ability to maintain, inspect and safely operate our pipeline.

After a recent survey in the city of Sunnyvale, PG&E identified trees and incompatible vegetation in the area above the pipeline that need to be removed.

What to Expect

PG&E contractors will use care throughout the tree and vegetation removal process. Between one to three crews of PG&E-authorized contractors (three to ten people) may be on site at any one time. During the day, residents can expect to see PG&E and contractor trucks parked in the area, and may hear heavy construction equipment noise. All crew vehicles and trucks will be clearly marked. Tree stumps will be ground with mechanized equipment to below grade for future safety and use of the area. Chips from limbs will be removed from the site, or run through a chipper and reused. Work areas will be marked off with proper traffic and pedestrian safety cones and warning signs. Please use caution when traveling near work areas.

Work Hours and Schedule

Vegetation and tree removal work on city-owned and franchise areas will be conducted in five areas within Sunnyvale, with work beginning in the north and moving south. All work will be conducted between the hours of 8 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Highway 237: removal work will take place in the area around HWY 237 near Lawrence Expy and HWY 101 and is estimated to be completed in three to four weeks.

Fair Oaks Park: removal work will take place along the eastern border of Fair Oaks Park near The King's Academy, continuing along N. Britton Ave to E. Duane Ave. Work is estimated to be completed in two to three weeks.

East California Avenue: removal work will take place along E. California Ave between N. Fair Oaks Ave and the Central Expy on-ramp. Work is estimated to be completed in two to three weeks.

Lawrence Expressway: removal work will take place along Lawrence Expy from the area north of HWY 101 to Reed Ave and is estimated to be completed in two to three weeks.

Homestead Road: removal work will take place along Homestead Road between SR 85 and Hollenbeck Ave and is estimated to be completed in two to three weeks.

Following the removal work, PG&E will be restoring the area with compatible landscaping. We want to thank you for your patience and cooperation as we conduct this important pipeline safety work.
